This issue like many others requires us to explain to legislators what we do and how certain changes will affect us, and their constituents.

Our students conducted blood pressure screenings and talked about managing medications. It was a great opportunity to practice our counseling skills and hopefully impact the course of the profession in Pennsylvania.

A Day in the Life.... of a P4 Rotating Through the Office of Inspector General

I completed my last and final rotation at the Office of Inspector General (OIG) in the Office of Evaluation and Inspection (OEI). The mission of the OIG is to protect the integrity of Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) programs, as well as the health and welfare of the beneficiaries of those programs. OIG has a responsibility to report both to the Secretary and to the Congress program/management problems and make recommendations to correct them.

OIG's duties are carried out through a nationwide network of audits, investigations, inspections and other mission-related functions performed by OIG components. This was an elective rotation that allowed me to be exposed to the public health aspect of the health care system and learn about research development from a public health and public administration point of view.

During my time at OIG-OEI, I spent the majority of my time working on two specific reports including Long Term Care Pharmacy Drug Rebate and Identification of Aberrant Claims Patterns in prescription Drug Event Data. I worked primarily with program analysts and discussed clinical

ways to improve and capture the full intent of the report's purpose. I helped to re-develop the methodology process for the reports by completing scientific information research on articles dealing with inappropriate prescribing of medications in the elderly population and pharmaceutical payment methodologies.

During this rotation, I utilized my skills in drug information researching to access vital primary literature to support the clinical aspect of the methodology for the reports.

On a daily basis I participated in discussions regarding legal and regulatory compliances regulations, discussions concerning health care policy and participated in working groups on health care (primarily pharmacy) quality improvement programs. All of the working groups were focused on evaluating that federally funded health care programs benefit the health and well-being of the general public that are beneficiaries of these programs (like Medicare and Medicaid). Some of the research projects I worked on throughout my rotation included background research on clinical aspects of Medicare Part D and Long Term Care Pharmacies, as well as prevalence and use of

medications in the geriatric community.

The program analysts allowed me to be very active in the development process and found that my insight as a pharmacy student who has worked directly with the patients who are the beneficiaries of the programs to be a much needed point of view that is often missing from the table.

Throughout my years in pharmacy school I was very active in public health events in the community through my involvement in pharmacy organizations. My participation in health fairs and community outreach fulfilled the micro level of public health by implementing public health programs, and has elevated my interest in pursuing a career that satisfies the public need for clinical pharmacists.

This rotation allowed me to be involved in the macro level of public health and be involved in discussions in which most pharmacists are not usual stakeholders. I was allowed to share my experiences about the clinical role of pharmacists and the impact pharmacists can have in the managing the health and well being of their patients.
