Complementary and Alternative Medicine in Pittsburgh

As an immigrant originally from Odessa, Ukraine I grew up learning a lot about natural remedies from my family. Often, these natural treatments were preferred over more modern therapy. For example, if I got symptoms of a cold, my grandma would boil some tea with honey and force me to eat lots of garlic. For any illness, my parents always believe that lots of liquids and rest would help the body heal itself.

Through these simple philosophies, I actually had quite a healthy child-hood. During pharmacy school I have gained much knowledge about certain disease states and ailments that can be treated effectively with specific medicines. While I realized the importance of learning about pharmacokinetics, pharmacodynamics, and other aspects of drugs, I wanted to learn more about alternative treatments for disease.

This passion for complementary and alternative medicine brought me to the office of Dr. Connor, where I discussed my desire to start a Special Topics elective alongside my classmate, Marina Shkayeva. Marina is a fellow third year pharmacy student who also is an immigrant from Russia. Similarly, she grew up nourished by immigrant parents who constantly used various natural treatments and utilizes complementary medicine in her daily life.

We came up with a plan to compile a list of various alternative medicine practitioners in the Pittsburgh area ranging from chiropractors to reiki masters. After contacting five different practitioners we decided to meet with each of them and conduct an interview to gain a better understanding about their practice. We learned more about the certification and licensing process required for each practitioner and what patients should look for when seeking alternative treatment.

Through this course I gained a great appreciation for the work that these complementary practitioners do on a

daily basis. First we met with Jeff Greenwald, who specializes in both massage therapy and traditional Japanese reiki. When asked what he thinks about the future of western and eastern medicine, Jeff truly believes that these will be more integrated together.

We also interviewed Susan Merenstein, owner of Murray Avenue Apothecary in Squirrel Hill, who specializes in natural hormonal replacement and supplements. She emphasized the need to find out the cause of every medical problem and how a practitioner cannot "just use a Band-Aid to cover it up". Every one of the practitioners we interviewed placed a great emphasis on finding the root cause of every illness, whether it is hypertension, diabetes, or Crohn's disease.

In addition, we spoke with Eric Randolph, a master tai-chi instructor, who explained the benefits of tai-chi including a better state of physical and mental balance and emotional harmony. Finally, we interviewed a naturopathic physician, Dr. Darrell Misak, and a chiropractor, Dr. Elizabeth Langer. Dr. Misak believes that illnesses come from causes that could potentially be reversed with changes in nutrition, sup-

plementation, and lifestyle and that ultimately we have complete control of our health. Dr. Langer uses chiropractics and acupuncture as gentler approaches than conventional medicine to help with various illnesses.

After completing all our interviews we compiled all the information onto a website along with some general information about the top 10 complementary treatments used in America. If you are interested in more information you can log onto https://sites.google.com/site/campittsburgh/ and click on any of the subpages to learn more. You can even watch the interviews we conducted with each practitioner to learn more about their practice and benefits of alternative medicine.

Through this course we have realized that each patient is a unique individual that should have an active role in their own health care. Many patients may strongly believe in alternative treatments and may seek complementary medicine when the typical approach to care does not show results. As future pharmacists, we must be aware of the options available and how to steer patients into the right direction.
